




Disability in the Mainstream

This movie came out in 1994 and is set in small town Iowa, where being different is not always a good thing. Gilbert is in his early 20's and cares for his morbidly obese mother, two sisters, and a brother Arnie who is developmentally disabled.

Gilbert works at the local grocery store and due to his mother's obesity is largely responsible for his younger brother who likes to be independent and do things that make him happy. But the things that make him happy can



get him in to trouble at times. Gilbert has a lot going on in his small town life between his responsibilities and his need for a 'normal life'. He struggles with being pulled in different directions.

When a new woman, Becky, comes to town, Gilbert and Arnie enjoy getting to know her. Although Gilbert is reluctant to tell Becky about his personal life, they start to form a friendship with hopes of more. As the movie progresses, Gilbert must make some choices that affect how his family functions.
